The science of wine pricing

I have a guest columnist this week

His name is Mike Shor, and he is an assistant professor of economics at Vanderbilt's Owen School of Management. Shor did an analysis of Nashville restaurant wine pricing, and I would like share



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the results with you. He selected restaurants with online wine lists and then randomly chose 20 reds, whites and sparkling wines at various price points.

A couple of common wines that appear on almost all of the lists (Veuve Clicquot Yellow Label and Caymus Conundrum) were used as a control. He then compared each restaurant's wine prices to the national median retail prices.

This is in not meant to indicate the quality of a restaurant's wine program. A restaurant with a temperature and humidity-controlled wine cellar and fine wine glasses is justified in charging more than one that has no such storage and uses cheap glasses you can't get your nose into. CP

The lower the index, the better the wine pricing. (listed from lowest index to highest)

My three "must try" wines for this week:

2005 MacMurray Ranch Pinot Gris, \$19.99

This is one of the better domestic Pinot Gris I can remember tasting. The texture is just fantastic — the perfect wine for grilled salmon or roast chicken.

2003 Arcadian Pinot Noir Dierberg Vineyard, \$59.99

California Pinot Noir doesn't get any better than this fabulous wine. It kind of tastes like spicy cranberries, so what a fantastic wine for Thanksgiving.

2004 Annie's Lane Clare Valley Riesling, \$13.99

This is an amazing wine, reminiscent of a grand cru Alsatian Riesling. Rich, thick and unctuous - serve it with spicy Thai peanut sauce. It's amazing.
